**Determination of the applicable legislation on social security  
- Request pursuant to Art. 87a of Regulation (EC) No. 883/04 -**

Dear Sir or Madam:

As you can see from the attached **"Certificate regarding the applicable legislation" (certificate A1)**, according to Regulation (EC) 883/2004 the legislation of ..... (name of country) applied to me on 27 June 2012 <sup>1</sup>. The relevant facts (kind and extent of activity) have since remained unchanged, so that, due to the transitional provision contained in Art. 87a of Regulation (EC) 883/2004 the change of Regulation (EC) 883/2004 by Regulation (EU) 465/12 does, in principle, not lead to a change regarding the applicable legislation on social security.

Without the transitional provision, according to the information I have, the legislation of another Member State <sup>2</sup> would, in principle, apply to me from 28 June 2012 <sup>3</sup>. I would like to be subject to this legislation instead of remaining covered by the transitional provision.

As my place of residence (centre of vital interests) is located in Germany, you are responsible for determining the legislation on social security to be applied according to Regulation (EC) 883/2004. Therefore, I would ask you to determine the legislation to be applied to me on the basis of the information contained in the **attached questionnaire**. If German legislation applies to me, please issue the appropriate certificate for me.
